

The map of New Zealand's sixteen regions shows regional rental affordability as a percentage of national affordability. Both national and regional affordability have been calculated by dividing the respective average weekly wages (March 2020) into the respective geometric mean rents (March 2020). There are now six regions, Auckland (113.2%); Marlborough (107.8%); Wellington (106.3%); Bay of Plenty (103.9%); Nelson (103%) and Tasman (101.7%) from last quarter, that are less rent affordable than the national average which is set as 100%. The remaining ten regions are all relatively more rent affordable than the national average. As usual two regions continue to stand out as being the most rent affordable. These were West Coast (63.3%) and Southland (67.7%).

Wages in Auckland, Wellington, and Taranaki continue to be above the national level, as shown below. Of the three regions, on Taranaki continues to have affordability below the national average (75%), reflecting more favourable rental conditions in that region relative to incomes.

Overall, a small deterioration of 2.09% can be seen at national level. The most significant decrease in affordability was seen in Canterbury (10.67%) and Gisborne (8.95%) and the most significant improvement in affordability was in Otago (13.07%), as well as 3 other regions i.e. Manawatū-Whanganui (5.65%), Hawke's Bay (4.78%) and Northland (0.03%).

RENTALS FOR THE MAIN CITIES

The rents over the last quarter (December 2019 to March 2020) and year (March 2019 to March 2020), for the main urban areas, are set out in the table. Over the past quarter, rental changes were decreased in only three regions and increased in remaining thirteen regions, led by Otago (11.8% decrease) and Canterbury (10.2% increase) and, with a net result of a 3.2% increase for the quarter.

Nationally, rents increased by 5.1% over the year, and this is reflected across majority of the regions. The largest annual rent increases in double digit were in Gisborne (31.7%), Southland (19.2%) and West Coast (12%). Auckland showed a slight increase of 2.7% for the year.

DATA SOURCES

This publication has been developed from private sector rental data supplied by the Ministry of Business Innovation and Employment (Bond Centre). Information on wage rates, demographics and the structure of the rental housing stock is drawn from Statistics NZ data. House price information has been extracted from Real Estate Institute New Zealand (REINZ) and Quotable Value (QV) NZ statistics.

TERMINOLOGY

Geometric mean rents are used in this publication as a better measure of rental trends than median and average rents because rents at the top end of the market are down weighted. For example, take three numbers 2,3, and 6.

The average is 3.66, the median is 3 and the geometric mean is 3.3. To calculate the geometric mean multiply the three numbers together and then calculate the cubed root.
